Research perspective

Initial assessment [based on a literature review]

The inquiry of underlying processes and structures, actor constellations and sensitivities of SD implementation at HEI – the sustainability governance — is rather rarely dealt with (Baker-Shelley et al., 2017; Dlouhá et al., 2016; Mader et al., 2013; Spira et al., 2013)

Research seems to have payed "minimal attention to either critical strategic level dynamics or reflexive activities that could facilitate and accelerate change" (Stephens and Graham, 2010)

> Necessity for the development of a research perspective on sustainability governance for HEIs









Research perspective

Governance Perspective

- We refer to an analytical understanding of governance
- Governance as (various) modes of social co-ordination
- Governance occurs in diverse forms of processes, structures and interaction of heterogeneous actors

Sustainable Development at HEIs

- Sustainability is a normative goal and guiding principle in the current discourse within many HEIs
- But advocating sustainability does not necessarily lead to a 'good' institutional governance within the institutions
 - Need to research on the various different forms of sustainability governance in HEIs









Research focus

Processes, structures and actors fostering sustainability within HEIs

Questions:

- Which conditions are required to institutionalize sustainability?
- In which ways and practices do HEIs acquire sustainability?
- How does sustainability 'come' to the HEIs?
- How do the different stakeholder within the HEI perceive the sustainability process? And how do they perceive their own influence to the process?
- What are the limiting and what are the fostering factors for a functioning sustainability governance?

Foundations

Literature review on the subjects governance & HEI, & sustainability & HEI

- 10 explorative expert interviews
- Adaptation of our theoretical framework (Governance Equalizer)
- Development of a researchstrategy for the main survey

Analysis/ Transfer

- Identification of typical forms of sustainability institutionalisation
- Indications on problems and solution approaches
- Guideline development
- Scientific publications

Main Survey

Interviews among different stakeholder at all 11 partner HEI within HOCHN

- representative from topmanagement
- student initiatives/ students
- researcher/ university teacher
- (technical) administration
- executive department on sustainability
- Focus: Implementation of sustainability at partner HEI
- Analysis regarding the five dimensions politics, organisation, profession, knowledge, public








"For all the members of the rectorate sustainability has been a top subject"


